

# BEACH & DIVE CLEAN-UP GUIDELINES

# 1. Choose your location:

- Make sure it is safe, accessible & that you are allowed to be there.
- Inform the National Parks authority if you are cleaning inside a protected area, you
  may be required to get a permit.
- Identify an assembly point for the group & a trash pick-up point for the group to dispose of the bags.
- Make sure you organize a way to remove the collected trash from the site.

# 2. Clean-ups best practice:

- Create an itinerary of the day to present to the volunteers.
- Organize people into teams of 4 people & give them an area to cover.
- One team member is responsible of recording the collected in the "Ocean Trash Data Collection Form" from the Ocean Conservancy. The others are responsible of collecting & sorting trash.
- Provide materials: Ocean Trash Data Collection Form, pencils to fill out the form, trash collection bags, gloves.
- Explain to clean-up volunteers how to fill out the Ocean Trash Data Collection Form.
- Have a group of volunteers responsible for weighing the trash (if possible).
- Remember to CLOSE the trash bags at the end & leaving them in your designated trash pick-up point.
- Make sure no trash from the event is left behind.





- \*\*\* In Dive clean-ups make sure to look inside the plastic trash (bottles, cups, packaging) to make sure no marine life is living inside (small fish, eggs, shrimps).
- \*\*\* If marine life is living or growing on the plastic trash, we recommend you leave it underwater.

### 3. Document the event

- Take before & after pictures of the area.
- Fill out the "Ocean Trash Data Collection Form" from the Ocean Conservancy.
- Make sure all trash is being weighed and recorded during the event.
- Share your collected data of the "Ocean Trash Data Collection Form" with environment@cdws.travel and cleanup@oceanconservancy.org

## 4. What do you need to bring?

- Your ID or passport.
- A Hat, sunglasses.
- Water bottle, preferably reusable.
- Your own CUTLERY TO EAT: plate, fork, spoon, cup, tapper wear. No disposable items!!
- FIRST AID KITS and a certified first aid responder.
- If you have your own GLOVES or REUSABLE MESH BAG for clean-ups, bring them.
- Drinks & Food. Preferably bring LAGER WATER BOTTLES (10L gallons/dispensers) and
   FOOD PACKAGED IN RESUABLE TAPPERWEAR not packaged in single-use plastics.

# 5. The to do's and don'ts in clean-ups:

- DO remind everybody to drink lots of water.
- DO collect non-biodegradable items: plastics items, Styrofoam items, metal items, glass items.
- DO collect even the smallest pieces of plastic or foam trash (broken rope, cigarette filters, broken piece of plastic, Styrofoam balls...)
- DO dispose of trash in properly allocated areas.





- DO respect the buddy system when doing underwater dive clean-ups.
- DON'T collect biodegradable items: driftwood, shells, corals, seaweed, seeds or other vegetation.
- DON'T burn any collected trash.
- DON'T step, touch or break any corals or vegetation during your clean-ups.

The Chamber of Diving and Water Sports encourages helping to protect our coastal and marine environment by organizing beach and dive clean-ups. You can also help by filling out the **Ocean Trash Collection Form.** We recommend you apply the best practice guidelines during all clean-ups. The environmental department at the CDWS will help with the organization of larger clean-ups.
